More on clarifying



We've been practicing noticing challenge words when we read. These words can hurt our understanding if we don't know the meaning. But if we clarify these words, they can give us deeper understanding. We learned four ways to **clarify** challenge words:

Look for a definition in the sentence	Look for a base word we know
Look for an example	Look for a hint

But often when we clarify, all we get is a hint to word meaning.
