

People often qualify for green cards by having a parent, child, or spouse who is a citizen. If your close relatives already have green cards, you might also qualify. Special training or unusual job skills can be another route to a green card.

Each year, another 50,000 green cards are awarded through a lottery. To enter, you must be a high school graduate. You also need to have worked for at least two years in a skilled job. David, for example, was a teacher. People from countries with many immigrants to the U.S., like England or China, are ineligible. If you come from a nation with fewer immigrants, like Japan or Kenya, you can try your luck. About ten million people enter the green card lottery each year.
