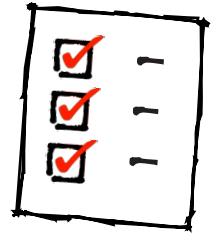

For a while, it seemed like things were getting better for undocumented immigrants. In 2014, President Obama issued policies to help people like Mai and her mother. He said that only immigrants convicted of serious crimes would be deported. 171
